



Imam Dawood Yasin

In September of 2009, Dawood Yasin was appointed the Muslim Life and International Service & Education Advisor at the William Jewett Tucker Foundation. In this role Dawood provides spiritual and religious support, offers educational seminars, and leads congregational prayers for Muslim residents at Dartmouth College and in the greater Hanover area.

Dawood began his studies in international relations at Southern Connecticut State University. However, he chose to interrupt his studies in 1991, accepting a job in the advertising industry allowing him to work in Paris, London, New York, Milan and South Africa for five years.

During his residence in South Africa, Dawood converted to Islam and returned briefly to the United States. He then spent five years in Damascus, studying Arabic, Islam, and spirituality. Upon completion of his studies, he returned to New Haven, CT where he served as the imam of a local mosque.



Sister Zahra Billoo

Zahra Billoo is a civil rights attorney and the executive director of the San Francisco Bay Area chapter of the Council on American Islamic Relations (CAIR). In this capacity, she leads the oldest CAIR chapter in the country, serving the Bay Area's 250,000 Muslims. Zahra also provides direct legal services for victims of law enforcement targeting and Islamophobia. Her work has been highlighted in local and national media outlets including the Christian Science Monitor, KTVU, MSNBC, NPR, and the San Jose Mercury News.

Zahra graduated Cum Laude from California State University, Long Beach with degrees in Human Resources Management and Political Science. She earned her J.D. from the University of California, Hastings College of the Law, and is licensed to practice law in California. As a law student, Zahra was awarded the Peggy Browning Fund Fellowship, and worked to work with the National Employment Law Project and became involved with the Muslim American Society.

Outside of her work with CAIR, Zahra bakes birthday cakes for foster children through Cake4Kids and is a coordinator for Project Feed, a monthly homeless feeding effort in downtown San Francisco.



Sheikh Omar Husain

Born and raised in Southern California, Omar Husain attended the University of Illinois at Chicago, on a tennis scholarship, and graduated with a degree in Information Sciences. After graduating, he travelled to Toronto, Canada where he studied the Arabic language and began studying the Islamic sciences. He then returned to the United States and worked as a business analyst for multiple consulting firms. During this time, he was blessed to complete his memorization of the Quran.

He then travelled to Cairo, Egypt, and, along with private studies, enrolled in Al-Azhar University, the oldest institute of Islamic learning in the world. He graduated from the College of Islamic studies and Arabic Language at Al-Azhar.

He has actively participated in various youth activities, and MSA study circles, as well as delivered khutbas, lectures, and held classes in various masjids across the U.S. He has also translated the soon to be published masterpiece of Imam Jalāl ad-Dīn Suyūṭī, Al-Itqān Fī U'lūm al-Qur'ān "Towards Perfecting the Qur'ānic Sciences." He is currently the Religious Director at MCECC.
